*I do, hereby, pledge

I pledge to **hana kūpono**
(do what is right) while visiting
the lands and waters of Maui County.

I will mindfully experience the
breathtaking natural beauty of the **‘āina**
(ancestral land) and the welcoming aloha
spirit of the **kama‘āina** (local people).

I will be **ha‘aha‘a** (humble) and **kūpono** (appropriate)
in my actions.

I will remember that each step I take is upon land that is
someone’s home, sacred site, and living history. If I do not
know proper, respectful, or safe behavior, it is my **kuleana**
(responsibility) to **‘imi na‘auao** (seek knowledge) and ask
before acting.

I will **maka‘ala** (be aware) while outdoors, and I will respect
the strength and power of ocean currents, rushing streams
and the variable and unfamiliar terrain of these islands.

I will admire wildlife from a safe and respectful distance,
as Hawaii is the endangered species capital of the world.

I will take nothing from this **wahi** (place) but memories
and leave nothing but gratitude.

I pledge to **mālama** (care for) Maui County, and
remember that:

He ali‘i ka ‘āina; he kauā ke kanaka.

“The land is a chief; man is its servant.”

Code of Conduct



- Drive as *slowly* and *carefully* as you like and **use pull outs** to let faster drivers pass.
- Visit state parks and county rest facilities.
- Enjoy the various farms, botanical gardens and fruit stands along the way.
- Avoid areas that lack visitor welcoming signage, as they are likely located on or beyond private properties.
- Park in designated parking stalls; vehicles protruding onto the highway are subject to being towed.
- East Maui weather and road conditions can pose dangers ~ including flash flood conditions that come with mudslides, high surf and rip tides along the coast.

NEW Wai‘ānapanapa State Park Reservation System

Wai‘ānapanapa State Park, famous for its black sand beach and stunning coastal views, is now requiring reservations for entry.

- All out-of-state visitors are now required to make reservations to enter the park. New fees for entry and parking are in effect. Entry for Hawai‘i residents remains free.
- Reservations are currently being accepted two weeks in advance of visits due to COVID-19 rules and restrictions. Same-day reservations are not available.
